Stop at marked and unmarked crosswalks whenever pedestrians are present. Exercise caution when approaching crosswalks by scanning both sides of the street for pedestrians. Pedestrians have equal rights and responsibilities; they should only attempt to cross roads at designated or unmarked crosswalks. School buses in Ohio use flashing amber lights to signal their intention to slow down and stop. Once stopped, the bus's lights will remain on until it comes to a complete halt. Other vehicles are not required to stop for amber lights but must do so when the bus is fully stopped. In Ohio, seat belts are mandatory for drivers and front-seat passengers aged 15 or older. Seat belt violations are considered secondary offenses. Additionally, child passenger safety laws require children to wear appropriate restraints based on their size, height, and weight. Ohio employs a point system to penalize unsafe driving behaviors. Wanton disregard for safety can result in a 4-point penalty. Moving violations incur 2 points, while DUIs earn 6 points. Speeding violations are punishable by 4, 2, or no points depending on the speed. Accumulating 12 or more points within two years results in driver's license suspension. Removing snow and ice enhances road visibility for both you and other drivers. It is unnecessary to let your engine warm up for 40 minutes before driving. Regularly checking tire tread depth is crucial, regardless of weather conditions. Studded tires with added traction are permitted in Ohio between November 1st and April 15th. They can also be used outside this period if retracted. Trailer braking systems are mandatory when the empty weight exceeds 3,000 pounds. Vehicles from both directions must stop at least 10 feet away from a school bus loading or unloading passengers. School buses use flashing red lights and stop arms to indicate they are stopped for loading or unloading. Do not proceed until the bus has started driving again or the driver signals for motorists to do so. A stop is not required when driving on an opposite side with four or more lanes. When exiting a freeway, wait until entering the deceleration lane before slowing down to avoid rear-end collisions. The move-over-law in Ohio protects emergency personnel and workers by requiring you to vacate the closest lane if approaching a stationary vehicle with flashing lights. If changing lanes is unsafe or not possible, slow down to a safe and prudent speed for the conditions. Drive carefully and keep an eye out for workers on the road, especially in areas where repairs or maintenance are being carried out. Slow down to avoid accidents, particularly rear-end collisions which can be prevented by leaving enough space behind you. At night or in bad weather, increase your following distance even more. Be cautious of small children near your vehicle and check that it's safe to back up if they're around. Always be aware of other road users and the risks associated with driving at excessive speeds. Don't forget that you can't see everything through your mirrors, so slow down when necessary for safety reasons. Never speed past speed limits or take unnecessary risks while driving.
